#### **Band nominated for IOM Awards of Excellence**



# **The Dave Smith Memorial Shield**Over the past few years, we have had a

Over the past few years, we have had a number of articles about the current Band members and a bit of background about each of them. As a change for 2021, we're going to look at each of the trophies that are awarded annually to members of the Band at the Annual Dinner that takes place at this time of year, and to start with we're going to look at the Dave Smith Memorial Shield.

The Dave Smith Memorial Shield has been awarded annually since 1991 (the year Dave sadly passed away) to an organisation, group or individual for services to Rushen Silver Band. Helen Smith, Dave Smith's daughter in law tells us more about the man behind the Shield.

There are still a good few people about who will know this, but for those who don't, Dave Smith was a retired Royal Marine Sergeant Bandmaster who devoted his entire life to music.

Born in Bristol, he was the only boy in a family of six, which may be why, despite being thoroughly spoilt by his five adoring sisters, he left home at the tender age of 14 to join the Royal Marines.

In due course this took him to the Isle of Man where he was stationed at the former Howstrake Holiday Camp which became, in July 1941, the Royal Naval School of Music with its boy musicians of the Royal Marine Bands. Here he met Mona, a Manx born WREN, who later became his wife and mother of his son Robin. Whilst there, he served alongside Jon Pertwee, later to become known for The Navy Lark and his portrayals of Doctor Who and Worzel Gummidge.

Dave's career then led him to the Royal Marine School of Music at Deal where he became a Sergeant Bandmaster. He was by then an accomplished musician and at one time had his own Swing Band in which he played the double bass. Whilst stationed at Deal he was posted to Singapore for a number of years, served on HMS Belfast and took part in what is known as the Yangtze Incident.

When in 1955 Mona was expecting, they wanted their baby to have British nationality so Dave was transferred back to the Fair Maid of Kent Hotel base in Deal so that the baby, Robin, could be born at Dover's Buckland Hospital.

As is often the case with service life, Mona wanted to return home to the Isle of Man with her family. Dave left the Marines and they took up residence in Onchan, where Robin's grandparents lived. Dave worked as an engineer at what was then Martin Bakers (also known as Ronaldsway Aircraft Company), and he soon became involved with Onchan Silver Band where ultimately, he became Bandmaster. Robin had also inherited his father's love of music so joined the band and learned to play the cornet.

Dave played with Rushen Silver Band for over 10 years and during that time became Assistant Bandmaster at Rushen Silver Band before moving on to become Bandmaster at Crosby Band in the late 1980s. His second wife Betty was a staunch supporter of the Band and active member of the Friends of Rushen Silver Band for many years.

For those who were in the Band at the time, I think many people's memories will be watching and listening to Dave conduct on piece in particular, "Victoria Cross", something that he really enjoyed doing, as well as passing his wealth of knowledge onto the Band.

"At Bradda Glen Café, to finish before the interval, the Band played 'America Patrol' where Band members walked off at different points in the piece and eventually leaving just one bass player to play until the end. I regularly was the last bass player left whilst the other Band members headed to the bar. I distinctly remember that night back in 1982 where Dave turned around to me and said "Don't worry, I'll stay to the end tonight". Great! I thought, I'll have a chance to leave the stage early tonight... but blow me, we got about 16 bars in and Dave puts his instrument down, walks off and heads to the bar to get a drink in, the first person to leave the stage! The irony of it was that Dave was tee-total so all he had even though he was first to the bar, was just a lemonade or orange juice, and nothing more than that!!

In the end though, and needless to say, whenever and wherever the Band was playing, in rain or shine, Dave could always be relied on to be there! During his time with the Band, Dave passed on his knowledge and recounted many stories from his experiences, and certainly played his part in making the Band what it is today."
